Last December 16, 2024, during the Library Christmas Party, Mr. Francis N. Arnibal, AV Coordinator, bid farewell to the Library System. During the Library Christmas party celebration, he narrated his experience as a working scholar, AV Technician, and now an AV Coordinator in the Audio Visual Center. He began his professional journey with enthusiasm, greatly supported by his former AV technicians and the AV Services Librarian. He is grateful for his experience, which bolstered his professional expertise and shaped his leadership.

Audio Visual Centers stands as a testament to the enduring importance of multimedia in education, entertainment, and cultural enrichment. As technology advances. these centers will undoubtedly adapt and thrive and will remain a vital resource for future generations. USC Instructional Media Center (IMC) was established in the 1980s when educators recognized the importance of multimedia resources in enhancing instructional delivery. The Center provided access to film projectors, slide projectors, and other analog media tools. The late Dr. Montana C. Saniel, Dean of Education, was the first and last IMC director.

The Instructional Media Center was renamed the Audio Visual Center in the early 2000s as part of the Library System under Dr. Marilou P. Tadlip, Director of the Library. All USC campuses have an assigned librarian acting as the AV Coordinator along with one professional technician. Today, the digital age has brought about a paradigm shift in audiovisual materials, embracing digital formats such as DVDs, CDs, and online resources.







SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE, FINE ARTS, & DESIGN




