VAN GANSEWINKEL HALL OPENS TO THE PUBLIC

There is a new Audio-Visual Hall in the main campus situated at the upper ground floor of Law and Graduate Business School in the Ernest Hoerdemann Building at Pelaez Street. It is named after Fr. Albert van Gansewinkel, SVD.

The van Gansewinkel Hall, as the facility is formally known, can comfortably accommodate 272 persons in seats designed for theater viewing. It can be a venue for cultural performances, seminars, forums and other like activities with its wide stage and good acoustics.

An SVD priest, Fr. Albert

van Gansewinkel, came to the Philippines sometime in the early thirties. In 1941, he became the secretary-general of the Colegio de San Carlos and taught Religion and Philosophy subjects in the College of Liberal Arts and a reading course in the College of Law.

Before coming to the country, the young Fr. van Gansewinkel studied in Rome and took post-graduate coursework in Philosophy. While studying at the Gregorian University, he was awarded the degree, Bachelor in Canon Law in

1930. He was ordained priest in 1932 and conferred the degree of Doctor in Sacred Theology in 1934.

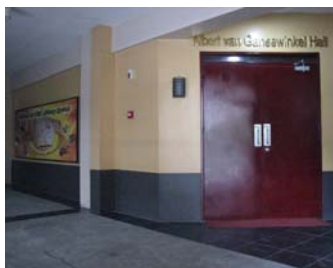
Fr. van Gansewinkel took over as the third SVD rector in 1949, months after the University of San Carlos was awarded its university status.

LIBRARY ROUND UP

South Campus BED Libraries Prepare for PAASCU Visit

The high school and grade school libraries of the South Campus Basic Education Department will undergo a re-survey visit by the Philippine Accrediting Association of Schools, Colleges and Universities (PAASCU) on November 10–11, 2008.

The grade school librarians are well over their target of storytelling and library instruction sessions for the pupils in the first semester. The high school librarian also has been to twenty (20) first year and fourth year classes for the students' lessons on library use and bibliography-writing.

The storytelling repertoire, library lesson outlines and plans and student output are ready for the accreditor's perusal.

BED Librarians Conduct Seminar in Bohol

A seminar-workshop entitled "Skills Refresher for Teacher-Librarians" was conducted by librarians Gloria Trinidad, Mila Fuentes, and Nelia Burdeos in Talibon, Bohol on July 26, 2008.

Held at the Talibon Pastoral Center through the organizational efforts of Sr. Maria Louella Grace L. Buscato, DST, the activity was participated in by 34 teacher-librarians and administrators from the member schools of the Bohol Association of Catholic Schools (BACS). Topics taken up were accessioning, cataloguing and classification, choosing and preparing news clippings for the information file, giving book talks, storytelling, and preparing book and bulletin board displays.

A follow-up was made for the school library of St. Augustine School in Alcantara, Cebu at the request of Sr. Tita Cuizon on September 8, 2008. Some of the school's library books that were difficult to classify and catalog were done by Miss Trinidad and Miss Burdeos.

Law Library Continues Refurbishing

The Law Library, now well-ensconced in the Ernest Hoerdemann Building, continues to refurbish, innovate, and reinvent itself, if you will in keeping with its sleek and modern settings.

The library has acquired a new photocopying machine that can print, scan, and of course, photocopy. The expense is offset by its fine quality print and convenience of use. The 16-seater Knowledge Navigation Center is complemented with a Perk/Discussion Room and a Reading Area with blue and black cushioned chairs.

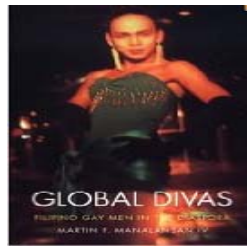
Bersales, J. E. (ed.). (2008). Visual fragments: The Rahmann-Maceda photographic collection, 1954-1964. Cebu City: San Carlos Publications.

Visual Fragments: Rahmann-Maceda Photographic Collection, 1954-1964 draws light on a body of photographs from the decade-long research collaboration between the missionary Anthropology professor, Fr. Rudolf Rahmann, SVD, and his student, Dr. Marcelino Maceda. Their “scientific tours” among Negritos and other indigenous groups of Central and Southern Philippines come alive once again with this first-ever publication of a selection of photographs they took during this period. To provide some background on their work and in order to appreciate the value of ethnographic photography to the discipline of anthropology, a collection of essays written by practicing anthropologists and a museum curator accompany this volume, which makes for a persuasive appreciation and compelling reading of one of the most important periods in the history of anthropology in the Philippines.

Manalansan, M. F. (2006). Global divas: Filipino gay men in the diaspora. Quezon City: Ateneo de Manila University Press.

Global Divas is a vivid ethnography of the global and transnational dimensions of gay identity as lived by Filipino immigrants in New York City. Martin Manalansan IV describes how Filipino gay immigrants, like many

queers of color, are creating alternative paths to queer modernity and citizenship. Manalansan locates diasporic, transnational, and global facets of gay and other queer identities within a framework of quotidian struggles. He



reveals the gritty, mundane, and often contradictory deeds and utterances of Filipino gay men as key elements of queer globalization and transnationalism.

This book shows how the experiences of diasporic gay Filipinos – marginalized figures at home and abroad – occupy a pivotal role in making us understand larger issues attending the conditions of globalization, the export of Filipino labor, the formation of subcultures within Philippine diaspora.

The cultural anthropologists would learn a lot from this book.

An elusive glossary is a special feature to make the reader understand the gay language used to illustrate a situation of an event in this book.

Masangkay, N. (2007). Philippines. Manila: Jamayco Publishing House.

The author is impelled to take a poetic view of the Philippine Land

scape, not merely as an objective tourist in places he has visited for the first time but more importantly, as a conjurer intent on mesmerizing an audience into a renewed appreciation of our country.

One of the beautiful features is the life of Nik Masangkay the artist whose master pieces are attractively and captivating to the eyes of the reader. The overall quality of the colors implemented of the artist in his paintings would stir-up the imagination of the viewer.

Rodrigo, R. (2006). Geny Lopez and the making of ABS-CBN. Quezon City: ABS-CBN Publishing.

The book is narrative story of ABS-CBN from 1946-1999. The author believes that the network’s story from its inception until the death of Geny Lopez in June 1999 has a definite narrative and cohesion. The story of ABS-CBN is being presented with completeness and integrity.

KAPITAN is the nickname of ABS-CBN employees for Eugenio “Geny” Lopez Jr. In the book, Kapitan is the dual tale of a man and the company he made. It tells a story of Geny Lopez’s dream for ABS-CBN and how he and a tightly-knit group of kindred spirits made it come true.

It has an index and photo-guide to bring us easily to pages where we want to refer and a bibliography that suggests further references.

Tips on Preserving Audio Cassette Tapes by Amy Kohlsted and Sara Doyle, for the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium

If given proper care, audio cassette tapes have a life expectancy of up to 30 years. Extend the life of your audio cassette tapes by following the tips below.

1. Recording. Always use new, high quality, brand name tapes, 90 minutes or shorter (60 preferred). Longer tapes are less durable. Use cassettes that are screwed together instead of welded. Avoid chromium dioxide tapes; they don't last as long.

2. Storage. Fast-forward and rewind the tapes before storage - make sure that the tapes are correctly wound evenly and smoothly onto the cassettes.

3. Environment. Keep your audio cassette collection in a cool, dry, dust-free environment with no moisture. Store away from direct sunlight and fluorescent light.

4. Handling cassette tapes. Make sure your hands are clean and free from oil, grease, and sweat before handling the tapes and make sure the area you are working in is free of dust.

5. Cleaning. Clean tape surfaces using a soft fabric product such as 3M "Tape Cleaning Fabric."

6. Precautions. Do not reuse old tapes. Push out the lugs (small squares at the top corners of cassette tapes) after recording to prevent the material from being taped over. Play tapes through every few years to check them and to minimize any sticky shed symptoms.

7. Making repairs. Sometimes a problem cassette can be salvaged by playing it on a professional tape deck.

8. Tape recorders. Always keep the tape path components clean. Keep recorder out of direct sunlight.

9. Reformatting. It is best to create two copies of each recording. The master copy is a copy of the original; the second, a digitized copy of the master saved onto a CD-ROM for access, is made for use and reference.

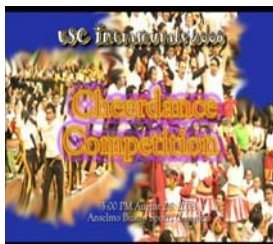
Documentary Videos, Anyone?
